Mac & Cheese Challenge

We've been talking about our Mac and Cheese Challenge but what is it exactly? Early in September members of the Social Action Committee will drive to Rutland, with a trailer, to pick up the bulk supplies and assembly line equipment. When we get back to the church we'll need help unloading and storing the materials we picked up. On the day before the event, volunteers will set up two or three assembly lines in the fellowship hall and stage the bulk supplies.

On **Sunday, September 11**, after the service, lunch will be provided and then we'll assemble to begin the process. A volunteer from another congregation, who is certified to oversee a food packaging event, will oversee the process that will, ideally employ 45 - 50 people. On the assembly line we'll use special equipment to carefully measure ingredients to produce individual packets of nutritionally enriched meals. 12,000 packets will be boxed up for efficient distribution, and the whole event should take about three hours, can you imagine that? Then we'll clean up and, later in the week begin to distribute the bounty.

So, we need your encouragement, your help unloading, setting up, and packaging, and we need your financial support. This is what Ascension is all about.

Film "Oriented" to Be Shown August 3 in Waitsfield

We recently joined Peace and Justice Center staff to preview the film Oriented, a feature documentary that explores the lives of three gay Palestinian friends confronting their national and sexual identity in Tel Aviv. As the Variety review stated, "The result puts a uniquely Middle Eastern spin on a classic coming-of-age tale." In making the film, first-time director Jake Witzenfeld followed the trio of real-life friends for a year and a half; the resulting 80-minute documentary has screened in festivals including the prestigious Sheffield Doc/Fest and Los Angeles Film Festival.

When we saw the film, we were struck by its honesty and the integrity of the people whom we meet—the three protagonists, their lovers, friends, and families. Full of humor and insights grounded in reality, this is "probably the first

film about gay Palestinians that is blissfully free of clichés" (+972). The documentary does not present clearly defined answers to the ambiguities that swirl around the young men at its heart; rather, it offers us space for exploration and conversation.

The Peace and Justice Center, with a number of cosponsoring organizations including Outright Vermont, Pride Center of Vermont, and Vermonters for a Just Peace in Palestine/Israel, will show the film at the Big Picture Theater and Cafe in Waitsfield on Wednesday, August 3, 2016, at 6:30 P.M. From the New England Synod Newsletter

Bishop James Hazelwood and Bishop Lloyd Allen of the Episcopal Diocese of Honduras presided at the dedication of a new church building in Yuscaran, Honduras this past weekend. (click video above to view a 3-minute movie of the dedication) La Iglesia de La Presentacion, the Church of the Presentation, began as a small community of six people in 2004, when then Pastors Jim and Lisa Hazelwood of St. Andrew in Charlestown, RI first traveled to Honduras. In the years that followed, the New England Synod began the first ever Lutheran-Episcopal Companion Diocese Synod relationship, and multiple partnerships began. Since 2005, people from all over New England have traveled to Honduras to help construct this church building, start scholarship programs for students, support a Nurse through the Lutheran Church of Honduras.

"The completion of this church in Yuscaran caps a chapter in our global mission partnership," Bishop Hazelwood said. "I am so pleased about this joint relationship with both the Episcopal and the Lutheran Church in Honduras." He continued, referencing the fact that the New England Synod has a joint companion relationship with the Lutherans as well as the Episcopalians.

The Episcopal Church in Honduras has tripled in size since 2001. They now have over 150 congregations after beginning with 56 at the turn of the century. This has largely been accomplished through training lay people to take leadership roles in small villages. "Where do they meet?" asked one of our group participants, Victoria Wittman. "In a small shop, in someone's home or under a tree," came the surprising answer from Deacon Kathy Pennbaker. This expansion of the church through the ancient practice of training lay leaders is one of the many ways we in the New England Synod are learning from our sisters and brothers in Honduras.

The New England Synod has Global Companion Relationships with Honduras, as well as with the Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land. Annually, small groups of people take pilgrimages to these places to support ministries, learn about the global mission of the church and grow in their walk of faith.
